Summary Points

- v 1 to 10 A Levite and his wife have a boy and hide him for three months. When they can't hide him any longer, they put him in a papyrus basket on the river, and his sister watches him. He is found by Pharaoh's daughter who adopts him as her son and names him Moses
- v 11 to 22 When Moses grows up, he defends a fellow Hebrew (Israelite, see information), by killing an Egyptian. He has to flee to Midian (see map) where he helps the daughters of Reuel, a Midianite priest, water their flock. Reuel invites him to stay and gives him Zipporah his daughter to be his wife by whom he has a son Gershom
- v 23 to 25 Meanwhile the Israelites are still in slavery and they cry to God who is aware of their problems (see theme)

Theme / Information

The origin of Hebrew

The word Hebrew comes from a root word meaning to stand on the other side. Some scholarsthink that the term was applied to Abram because he crossed the River Euphrates to come to the land of Canaan.

Joshua's review of Israel's history would seem to support this idea as he mentions crossing rivers several times:

Joshua 24 verses 3. 11 and 15

Other scholars think the name comes from Eber one of Abraham's ancestors mentioned in Genesis:

Genesis 10 verses 24 and 25


